# . Winter Fly Tying Classes By Chris Yasher

"Cure some cabin fever and stock your fly boxes for the upcoming season!

CVTU will again offer a winter fly-tying course, in conjunction with the South Middleton Township Parks & Recreation Department, at the Boiling Springs High School, in room 110 starting January 19. The course will run every Tuesday for eight weeks from 1900-2100 and end on March 08. Both the beginner and advanced sessions will be conducted simultaneously; while the advanced session will learn techniques that will prepare the angler for a lifetime of fly-tying. Students in the beginner course will learn to tie 6-8 flies, while also gaining crucial skills, technique, and knowledge necessary for upcoming fly-fishing season.

Each class will be limited to 20-students, advanced registration is recommended as the price doubles after January 05, 2016. The fee is \$11 for South Middleton Township residents, and \$14 for non-residents if you register prior to January 5<sup>th</sup>, 2016 deadline. In addition, for students in the beginner course, fly tying material, a hook kit, and instructional material will be provided for the various patterns that will be taught. A list of patterns and required materials will be provided in advance for intermediate/advanced tiers that will identify patterns tied throughout the course. While there is often extra material for use at each class, advanced tiers are responsible for their own kit (vise, hooks, and material). All individuals and families are welcome to attend this Cumberland Valley tradition, and registration will begin around the second week of December 2015. # From the Archives By Dave Weaver

In 1980 an English gentleman named Ron Holloway visited the Cumberland Valley and teamed up with Charlie Fox to conduct a session at Bonnybrook to educate CVTU members about how a stream river keeper from the Itchen River manages weeds through trimming. Ron deftly used a scythe to cut through the elodea to better facilitate removal of sediment. Ron wrote that the purpose of weed cutting was to:

"Lower the water level and get the river back into the natural banks. . . . The weed cutting operations should start in the spring at a time when the first signs of growth are noticed. The initial cut is going to be very heavy so be very careful when carrying it out as this will establish the weed pattern for the rest of the year."

Sound familiar? For many of us, weed trimming is a familiar work project and remains important

maintenance for the upper Letort, especially in the last couple decades as sinkholes have become prevalent in that area and the necessity of keeping the creek in its banks has become more important. #### Fly of the Month "U" Midge By Clark Hall

In the excellent DVD, "Bugs of the Underworld" by Ralph and Lisa Cutter, there is a segment showing midge pupa emerging in the surface film. Upon reaching the surface, the pupa use their rear and head segments to grip the surface film while wriggling out of the pupal shuck at the head area of the pupa. While going through this transformation, the pupa assume a "U" shape hanging in the surface film. The "U" Midge is designed to imitate this behavior.

The "U" Midge is not my first choice for midging trout as it is often difficult to see on the water. However, if the other offerings are ignored, and the trout continue to rise, the "U" Midge will often take the most difficult fish. Greasing the fly with floatant, then dusting the top with Frog Fanny increases its visibility.


Hook: Daiichi 1110, size 26


Thread: Uni 8/0, Gray

Body: Razor Foam, 1 mm, gray

- -Put a fine ~1.5" sewing needle in your vice jaws with the needle point forward.
- -Start the thread about 10 mm from the needle point. Make about 4 turns.
- -Cut the Razor Foam into 2 mm wide strips. Cut two 15 mm long pieces from the strips.
- -Stack the uncut faces together holding them between your left thumb and forefinger. Straddle the tie-in point on the needle.
- -Make two turns of thread around the foam and needle.
- -Make a 4 turn whip finish around the same point as the first two turns.
- -Bring the thread between the foam strips and around the needle to position it for finishing the first segment.
- -Make two turns of thread around the foam and needle as before. If the segment is too large or too small, back off and do it again. Whip finish at the same point.
- -Repeat the last 2 steps until there are 5 full segments. Trimming the ends will result in 7 segments in the finished body.
- -After the 6<sup>th</sup> whip finish, trim thread, and pull the body off the needle. Trim the ends.
- -Put hook in vice, start thread about 1 eye width behind the eye, and wrap to end of the straight portion of the shank. Position thread about ¼ of the way back toward the eye.
- -Position the body with the space between the 3<sup>rd</sup> and middle segments over the hanging thread. Make 4 tight turns to bind the body to the hook keeping the body on top of the hook.

-Advance the thread between the body and the hook to the next space between the segments. Bind again with 4 tight turns. Advance the thread between the body and the hook to just behind the eye. Whip finish and trim.
