Youth Background Clearances By Jeb Betar

Many of CVTU's youth programs and activities will be ramping up in the next several This is a reminder that any CVTU months. member must obtain a PA Child Abuse History Certification from the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services before he or she can volunteer their time to support CVTU's Youth Programs. A copy of the certification must be provided to me, as I maintain CVTU's list of cleared volunteers. The process for volunteers who have lived in Pennsylvania for at least 10 years is twofold: obtain a PA State Police criminal history check. and request a Child Abuse Certification from the PA Department of Human Services. process is free, however if a volunteer has not resided in Pennsylvania for at least 10 years, the volunteer will have to submit to FBI fingerprinting as a third step in the process and there may be a fee associated with the FBI action. I have the latest information, web sites, and procedures and can assist any member who would like to volunteer and needs the certification. If any member has questions or wants to verify whether he or she has the required clearance, I can be reached at (571) -643-8101 or via email at jebbetar25@gmail.com.

Fly of the Month Mike J. Parahopper By C. Biff Healy

This fly is dedicated to a very special man: Michael D. Juliana, who went to fish the great trout stream in the sky on October 17, 2015. Mike was responsible for introducing me to the Cumberland Valley back in 1977. He first introduced me to a garrulous fellow named Ross Trimmer. Thus started for yours truly a long list of mentors: Ed Koch, Charlie Fox, Vince Marinaro, Ed Shenk, Lefty Kreh, and Charlie Meck. At the time I did not appreciate the blessing that Mike had bestowed upon me. We fished Mountain Creek in July when it was so cold that we jostled one another seeking warmth in shafts of sunlight; hellgrammites in Sherman's Creek, and spring outings at Allenberry with YBAC. Mike, save me a place on the stream, as I hope I get to join you again one day.

Hook: #12 Eagle Claw Dry Fly (#L0595)
½" long piece of closed cell foam, approximately ¼
thick, colored green or yellow with permanent marker.
White poly yarn, floating
Sili legs
Olive green silk dubbing (Krienik)
Turkey tail feather
Light Ginger hackle

Crimp the barb of the hook and mount in the vise. Wind a base of thread from just behind the eye to the bend of the hook. Slit the foam about half way through the thickness of the foam, half the length, and tie in at the bend with the foam extending beyond the bend. Lash the foam securely then attach a post made of the poly yarn at the front half of the hook. Return the thread to the hook bend and dub a thorax to the post. Knot two pieces of the sili legs with a single overhand knot. Tie these in on either side of the post on the side of the body, with the knot at the bend of the hook. Dub the thread to the eye of the hook, and return to the post. Attach a doubled, 1/4" wide lacquered piece of turkey tail feather to the thorax with the end extending to the end of the abdomen extension. Take a wrap around the post and tie in the ginger hackle. Take three or four wraps around the post and tie off at the eye. Trim the sili legs so that there is about ½ inch of leg beyond the knot. This is not a fly quickly tied, but one that produces well when the grasshoppers are active, and is great as an indicator fly with a midge nymph dangling off the hook bend.
