

## Casting & Tying Competition By Tom Miller

The Cumberland Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited will be hosting its Annual Mid Atlantic Fly Casting & Fly Tying Championships on June 20<sup>th</sup>, 2015 at Allenberry Resort in Boiling Springs, PA. The Pennsylvania Fly Fishing Museum will host the competitions in conjunction with its 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Heritage Day Celebration. The Heritage Day event is a full day of celebrating the fly fishing heritage in the State of Pennsylvania with over 60 venders and exhibitors, hands on demonstrations, special seminars, instruction, raffles, auctions and the always popular Fish Swim Race on the Yellow Breeches for a chance to win \$500! The fly tying competition is open to all with categories for Men, Women and Youth along with an Open Division. Competitors are asked to submit sample flies with their entry and will be judged by the flies they tie on the day of the contest. Full details and contest rules will be available on CVTU's website at <a href="https://www.pacvtu.org">www.pacvtu.org</a>. There is no fee to enter any of the amateur classes while the Open Division entry fee is \$25. Open Division entrants will be competing for cash prizes while the winning juniors, amateur women and men will be awarded with merchandise prizes and plaques.

Along with the fly tying contest, CVTU in association with the Chesapeake Council of the International Federation of Fly Fishers, will also host a 5-weight fly casting competition. This contest is also open to all with categories for men, women and youth along with an Open Division for more experienced guides, instructors professionals. Competitors will be challenged by both accuracy and distance tasks with winners determined by the highest combined score. All winning competitors will receive plaques along with merchandise prizes. The entrance fee is \$25 for pre-registration, postmarked by June 12, 2015, or you can sign up the day of the event for \$30. ### Clearances for CVTU Youth Volunteers By John Leonard

If you were not at April's membership meeting and you volunteer at CVTU's youth activities, THIS IS IMPORTANT. Last year our legislature passed the Child Protection Act. This new law means that after July 1, 2015, youth volunteers for CVTU will be required to have current PA State Police Criminal Record Check and PA Child Abuse History Clearance records on file with CVTU's Treasurer. They need to be renewed every three years and you will be notified by our Treasurer when it's time to renew. If you do not have these clearances after 7/1/15, you will NOT be allowed to participate at the youth activity. Getting the clearances is not difficult. Your Board wants to make it as easy as possible for you to get your clearances with no cost to you. The first step is getting the PA State Police Criminal Record Check. Rather than mailing in this form, go online to https://epatch.state.pa.us. Click on "Submit a New Record Check" and follow the instructions. You will need a credit card for the \$10.00 charge to get your record. Get an electronic receipt for the charge. After several days, your record will be e-mailed back to you. Save the e-mail and print copies for your file. A copy of the State Police Criminal Record Check must be sent in with your PA Child Abuse History Clearance application. Make copies of the report and keep the original at home.

The Child Abuse History Clearance can be filled out online by going to <a href="http://www.dhs.state.pa.us/cs/groups/webcontent/documents/form/s">http://www.dhs.state.pa.us/cs/groups/webcontent/documents/form/s</a> 001762.pdf.

Complete the **Pennsylvania Child Abuse History** Clearance form, print it, and bring it to May or June's membership meeting along with the PA State Police Criminal Record Check and your electronic receipt you received by e-mail. Board members will be at May and June's membership meeting at 6:00 PM to help you complete your forms, if needed, and to reimburse you for your State Police report. They will take your completed Child Abuse History form and your State Police record, add a \$10 money order we have purchased, and mail the two forms in for you. In 2-3 weeks, the Child Abuse record will be mailed back to you. Keep the original and make a copy. Give a copy of BOTH your State Police record and Child Abuse record to Jeb Betar, our Treasurer, at the next membership meeting.

We appreciate your understanding regarding this new law and the changes we are required to make with our youth volunteers at CVTU. Most importantly, we appreciate those that help at our youth activities...helping to introduce future Trout Unlimited members to cold-water conservation and to the sport of fly fishing.

## Trout in the Classroom Update By Biff Healy

On Monday and Tuesday April 27,28, the Yellow Breeches Education Center at Frankford Celebrated the culmination of a years work raising Brook Trout from egg to fingerling, with the release of over 200 healthy Brookies in the Big Spring Creek. The teacher in charge, Jennifer Tynan said that it was a bittersweet moment for all as they had become attached to seeing their charges on a daily basis. The trout were on the average over three inches and were showing the brook trout's colors with the white on the leading edge of the fins being very evident. They are now working on hatching some "hackle quality" chicks from eggs.

The release of the trout was followed by some casting lessons at a local pond with knot tying lessons before the boys attacked the local population of sunfish with flies from the TIC coordinator, and rods from the CVTU chapter. Several sunnies fell to the efforts of the novices, enough to keep all occupied for several hours. Thanks to Chet Hagenbarth for his help at this outing. ### Fly of the Month Damselfly By Alan Howe

My first several trips to the "ditch" on Big Spring Creek ended as they probably should have-fishless. I had been told this stretch was difficult, so lheld true to the standard practice of small flies on long, slender leaders with high hopes. Nothing doing. The only hit I had in those visits was on an unattended soft hackle dangling at the end of line while I chatted with a fellow angler. Of course, I missed that. Eventually, I found a rather different solution.

I sample benthic macroinvertebrates for Arlington County in northern Virginia. A recent change in sampling protocol turned up previously unseen hordes of damselfly larvae. We went from none to scores. Each sample included specimens in colors of dark amber, dark olive, brown, gray, and black. Sizes ranged from 1/4 of an inch to 1 1/2 inches in some quarters to 3/4 to 2 inches in later samples. The thing was, I did not see nearly as many adult damsels as my sampling would lead me to expect. I see an occasional adult damselfly at the ditch. Maybe there are hordes there, too, I wondered.

Having handled these bugs up close, it did not take long to devise a pattern to test. I selected the largest hook size I wanted to cast on a four weight and got busy. In three successive trips to the ditch spaced two weeks apart, I caught my first fish--a seven-inch brookie--and my second--a seventeeninch rainbow--on my first visit, two more brookies on the second, and caught one brookie and lost another on the third. I call that success.

Damselflies are often mistaken for minnows. They are vigorous swimmers. A down and across cast, taking up and then giving slack allows the fly to swim and drift alternately. The trout approve.

Hook: Mustad 3906B #6 (this is a 2x-long, heavy hook)

Tail: Olive ostrich herl (I double this over so the tails stay spread, tying in two loops to represent the three tails of the natural.)

Body: Olive embroidery thread (This darkens some when wet. I separate out two batches of two strands each. I take the first off the back of the hook at mid shank and twist it into a rope, grabbing with hackle pliers so it does not untwist. Then I wrap forward almost to the eye. I do the same with the second pair of strands coming from the tails all the way forward. You can see that they imitates fairly well the segmented body of the natural.)

Wing case: Pheasant tail fibers (I take the thread back over the body to tie these and the hackle in.)

Hackle: Olive India Hen (I cut the fibers off one side, so the legs are not too dense. I found stripping them off weakens the stem. Then I cut the hackle off the top, again so there are not too many fibers. The natural has only six legs, after all). Bring the pheasant tail fibers forward, tie them down, and whip finish and cement.

I do not weight this fly or any of my nymphs. It gets down where it needs to be if you let it. Again, the naturals can be found in different colors and sizes simultaneously, so choose a size and color that appeals to you and then see if the trout approve. Feel free to complain to me if they don't!
