An Unusual Year

This has been an unusual year with record breaking precipitation across Pennsylvania. For many of us who love wade fishing larger rivers for smallmouth bass, it's been especially disappointing as the rivers have mostly been too high and muddy when they weren't downright flooded. Serious damage across the state and Mid-Atlantic has been widespread. I'm told the wet weather has also put a real damper on fall foliage. And so it has.

On the bright side, many small freestone stream aficionados have had a great year with the higher water levels. I like mountain brookie streams as much as anyone else, but they treated me, at best, maybe a bit better than average. How all of this will impact our local trout streams going forward is a matter of speculation. I've seen some very good gravel and areas long filled with sediment have been blown clear by the high water. Maybe a good spawn will follow. The high water this summer also kept temps down and I'd like to believe that we may see strong survival of wild trout in some downstream or otherwise marginal areas.

Speaking of wild trout, we have a presentation this month on the results of genetic research on brookies in Pennsylvania. It seems that hatchery genes aren't especially prevalent in these populations. I'm looking forward to this. Why don't you come out too, especially if you haven't been to a membership meeting in a long time? There are plenty of additional activities you can join or support as well. We could use your help on the Limestoner committee and other worthy projects.

From the President, John Leonard


The attendance October's meeting was above average and there were a lot of questions for Dave McMullen on his restoration plan for the Yellow Breeches on Allenberry's property. The project will begin about January 1st and Dave hopes to be finished by March 1st when stocking begins. He may have up to three areas working at once, but he always begins at the downstream part of each section and works upstream. He will be placing about 25 structures in about 2,500 feet of stream. Allenberry will keep the stream open to fishing, but there will not be any parking on Allenberry's property nor will they be putting in a public parking lot. The big IF for the project is the weather. If the entire project is not completed by March 1st, work will resume sometime after June 15th. The image below shows the project scope.

The CVTU web site is being updated and work should be completed by the end of 2018. Winter Fly Tying Classes By Ken Palmer

The annual CVTU/South Middleton Twp. fly tying class dates have been established. Classes begin on Tuesday January 29, 2019 and will continue every Tuesday night for Eight weeks ending on March 19, 2019. Classes are held at the Boiling Springs High School from 7 PM to 9 PM.

The classes are divided into TWO **BEGINNERS/LIMITED TYING** groups. EXPERIENCE INTERMEDIATE/ and ADVANCED. The BEGINNER/LIMITED EXPERIENCE group will be led by Jerry Kerstetter. This class covers the basic methods of fly tying, building your skills each week to become a proficient tier after eight weeks. Participants should have their own basic tools tying vise, scissors, bobbin, whip finishing tool, etc. These tools are sold at local fly shops. If you don't have these tools, we can provide them for you. All course materials including hooks will be provided. The INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED class will be led by a different class leader each week. The classes will be led by the following group of outstanding volunteer tiers. Don Albright, Tony Dranzo, Darwin Gaston, Clark Hall, Biff Healy, Steve Parker, Ken Okorn, and Neal Sunday. This class is designed for the tier with some experience and a desire to learn new techniques and patterns. The participants are asked to bring their own tools to class and then tie along with the leader. All course materials including hooks will be provided.

Important information about the classes and registration instructions are as follows.

-Youth participants under the age of 16 must be accompanied by a registered adult.

-Fees: \$ 15 for a township resident if you register before January 15. \$ 25 if you register after January 15. \$ 21 for a non-township resident registering before January 15 and \$ 31 if you register after January 15.

-Register Early. Class size is somewhat limited due to class room capacity.


The Feeling By Robert Shaw

The change in the weather obviously triggers certain genetic responses in trout, it also seems to trigger responses of my own. I get a feeling. A feeling of wanderlust, the need to get out and have an adventure. Deep in my DNA is a need to sleep outside under the stars, to feel the cool of autumn and to sit by the fire. I satisfy this desire by camping and fishing along the Little Juniata. This is the second year in a row I have made this trip, so... I guess it is a tradition now. I stay at the Green Hills RV Park and Campground and fish for two days straight. It isn't necessarily roughing it and for 20 bucks a night you can pitch a tent, have access to electricity, showers, and toilets. I'll tell you the prospect of a shower before crawling in a sleeping bag is always welcoming, especially this year when you have thick crust of bug spray covering your body.

I love the feeling of waking up next to the stream I'm going to fish. Knowing I won't have

to drive two hours, fish, then have a two hour drive home is beyond relaxing. With two days to fish, the desire to explore new water seems to take over. This trip I fished parts of the Little J I've never even seen before. I explored the sections upstream of Spruce creek, and parts below the Gorge section. I caught a few fish in each new area. I also made the Pilgrimage to the George Harvey section of Spruce Creek. Here the Wild Brown and occasional wild rainbow trout take on the opportunistic feeding habits of Pennsylvania's native brookies.

Days like this I don't eat like the fish do. They are feeding heavily getting ready for the spawn. I am typically too focused on the fishing to even realize that hungry feeling, that is until the moment I step out of the water and the growling starts. It startles me and I quickly survey my surroundings for a bear, or a cougar, or a really big squirrel. I inevitably realize that it is my stomach making these deep guttural growls. I sustain myself with whatever type of cereal bar or beef jerky I managed to stash in my waders and jump into my jeep and head to the next spot. The prospect of the next spot is always one of wonder, and the feeling of endless possibilities. Perhaps the biggest trout of my life, perhaps an unfortunate dip in the cool water, or maybe the train whistle that will finally finish the job and blow out my ear drums. I have a feeling I'll see you again soon Little Juniata River.

The Purple (Brussels Sprout Bag) Streamer By Biff Healy

I think every fly tier has those moments. You know the feeling. After tying dozens of scripted standard flies, you feel the need to create something new, bright and *different!*

As I sat at my bench one day, looking at tying another dozen bead head prince nymphs, my wife came into the room with the question "Can you use this for anything?" She was holding a purple mesh bag that had a label for Brussels sprouts on it. At first I hesitated, then when I took it from her hands, I noted that when stretched out length wise, the junctions of the bag formed dark striations, a barring that resembles that of a Parr trout. Hmmm.

I thanked her and proceeded to play with this new material. I tried a couple options, even taking one to Sherman's Creek to test. It worked. Back at the bench, I combined the listed materials into a streamer that is *different*, catches fish, and satisfied my desire to be creative in my avocation. What to call it?

I was going to call it the "Purple BSB streamer." Then while showing it to members at the October meeting, someone mentioned that it was the "Trash-to-Treasure" fly. I'm still undecided, what do you think?

Hook: #12, 3xl Streamer hook **Thread**: Purple 6/0 Uni-Thread

Over wing: A piece of the Brussels Sprout Bag, cut longer than the hook by about 1/5th the hook length.

Body: Dyed Pearl Diamond Braid Flash

Belly: Krenik Pearl Flash

Weight: 0.015 lead wrapped 1/3 the length at

the eve end of the hook.

The moral of this story is: You never know what might happen when you think "outside -the-box." The very least is a break from sometimes monotonous periods at the bench. Don't get me wrong, as Jerry Kerstetter tells his students, one can only get really good at tying by *PRACTICE!* But a little variety is a good thing too! If you have any ideas for a name for this fly let me know. biffer1966@hotmail.com.
